Our Nurturing School Approach

What does a nurturing approach mean for Claremont?

- We recognise the impact of early childhood experiences upon future development.
- We have high expectations for all pupil's progress and attainment from their individual starting points.
- We create a supportive and challenging environment for children to be happy and succeed.
- We recognise the importance of positive relationships to promote healthy social and emotional development and that these should be reliable, predictable and consistent where possible.
- We aim to make all visitors feel welcome and valued in our school.
- We aim to work effectively with parents and the wider community.
- Parents and the community support and contribute to our work towards the National Nurturing Schools Programme.
- The nurturing approach is based on the six principles of Nurture.

Ways you can help your child

- Attend your child's parents evening and share any information that will support your child.
- Let us know if there are any changes in your child's life or event which may unsettle them at school
- Ensure that we have up to date contact information so we can communicate with you about your child
- Join us for school events as our children tell us that they feel proud and happy when their parents are in school.
- Encourage your child to tell you about their learning and what they enjoy at school.
- Talk with your child about their feelings .

What does this look like at Claremont?

- We have a consistent behaviour policy to support our pupils.
- We understand that sometimes children are finding things difficult and therefore adapt plans to support them.
- There are calm kits in all classrooms and staff offices to support children to regulate their emotions.
- There are calm areas in every classroom that children can access if they feel they need some time out or space.
- There is an emotion words of the week. These are then placed onto our emotional scale to develop children's emotional literacy.
- Every classroom uses a visual timetable to support all learners.

What this means for your child?

- The development of social and emotional skills is at the heart of our curriculum.
- We use positive reinforcement and nurturing opportunities to recognise and manage their emotions.
- We act on the pupil voice through questionnaires, class assemblies, circle time and school council meetings.
- Transitions are carefully planned.
- Children feel safe at Claremont and are supported to develop their emotional literacy.
- We understand the children learn and develop at different ages and stages and this is reflected in our curriculum and approaches.
- Children will be provided with the necessary environment, support and challenge to succeed.
- Claremont access a range of support services for children including Child in Mind and art therapy.
